GENERAL FLORICULTURE DEPARTMENT RULES.

1. Competition is open to all amateur growers and arrangers.
2. Entry tags will be provided and must accompany each and every entry.
3. **All entries are to be clean and insect free . Entry Chairmen have the right to disqualify any exhibit, which does not conform to this schedule.**
4. **Exhibitors are allowed unlimited entries in each lot if each is a separate named variety, type, or color. Lots will be divided as entries warrant. All will be judged variety against variety.**
5. **All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor within COCHISE COUNTY,** except in native dry arrangements.
6. **Any entry by a junior exhibitor (18 years and under) may be made in any Lot by adding the letter "J" to the Lot Number.**
7. Exhibitors must furnish their own containers, which should be presentable. The vase or container can be used to enhance the presentation.

If using a jar, the labels must be covered or removed. Containers must be leak proof and sturdy enough to support the display. The size should fit the entry in depth and width, and be adjusted to prevent spilling or slipping of flowers. **(Example: Don't use tall, wide-mouth containers to hold 3 small stems.) No paper cups or soft plastic containers will be accepted.** The Fair Association will not assume responsibility for breakage.

ARTISTIC ARRANGEMENTS: Arrangements using artificial flowers or foliage will not be accepted. Dried materials may be sprayed or colored. LABELING: All tags and entry sheets must be filled out before submitting material. BE SURE THAT THE VARIETY IS WRITTEN ON THE EXHIBITOR'S TAG. The Fair will reserve the right to remove any exhibit at any time that its appearance is unsuited to remain on exhibit.

Conditioning Plant Material – All fresh plant material should be conditioned several hours before exhibiting or arranging. Specimens should be cut in late afternoon or early morning. A sharp knife or clippers should be used to cut stem or a long slant for the greatest intake of water. Cut specimens, should be placed in a vessel of deep tepid water in a cool, dark place for several hours or overnight. **For additional information contact Floriculture Superintendent at 720-5094.**

JUDGING: Each flower has its own criteria, but still must meet the same 4 factor headings. They will be: "Presentation" to show the uniformity and positioning of the flowers for the best presentation. "Grooming" to show no burnt, insect damaged, or dead parts. "Healthy Foliage" is to be left on to determine the health of the plant. And last is, "Flowers". If the lot calls for 3 stems-- 3 flowers should be completely open but not in there last stage. Flowers should be as uniform as possible with the same size, shape, color, and scent.

Potted Plants should have good looking soil and not be too root bound. Pots should be clean and have basins. The top of the soil should be no further down than 2" below top edge of pot, and no nursery pots larger then a 2 gal. Size.
